EDUCATION CUTS—HOW IT EFFECTS YOU

The effects of the deep budget cuts passed by those in control at the state capitol in Austin in 2011 are still being felt. More than \$1 billion in grant funding was wiped out and most of that loss has not been made up. For instance, we are still waiting for the restoration of \$200 million for full-day pre-kindergarten expansion grants. (Only \$30 million of that amount for pre-K has been added back to the biennial budget for 2014-2015, and it's not earmarked for full-day pre-K expansion grants.) Per-pupil funding for school districts was cut by \$4 billion in 2011, and we are still \$600 million short of making up that loss in 2014 -2015. But that understates the problem. As the Center for Public Policy Priorities pointed out in a study of the budget cuts last year, school funding has not made it back anywhere close to the prerecession level we had reached in

2008. By that yardstick, current funding levels reflect "a \$611 per-student drop in funding from pre-recession levels or \$18,330 per classroom of 30 students."

Meanwhile, the number of students enrolled in our public schools has grown by roughly 85,000 per year to more than five million, and fully 60 percent of them are economically disadvantaged, high-need children.

Sen. Wendy Davis, candidate for governor, is making a big issue of the ongoing funding cuts in her election contest with Attorney General Greg Abbott, and she invites you to tell your story about the cuts' effect on you and yours. Here's that invitation, in her own words: "Back in 2011, Greg Abbott's allies in Austin slashed education funding in Texas by \$5.4 billion. When Texas school districts sued to have their funds restored, Abbott defended the
